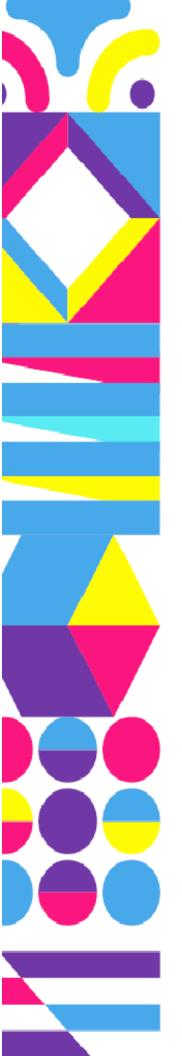

REPRESENTATIONS MADE TO CHIEF MINISTERS, TOURISM MINISTERS, CHIEF SECRETARIES OF STATES OF EASTERN REGION

On behalf of the members of the Association, requests and representations were made to the office of Chief Ministers, Tourism Ministers, Excise Chief Secretaries and other department Secretaries of all states of Eastern India in connection to excise related matter, Property Tax, Municipal Taxes, Electricity Fixed Charges, GST, and vaccination.

FOOD SAFETY TRAINING & CERTIFICATION (FOSTAC) PROGRAM IN ADVANCE CATERING

Hotel & Restaurant Association of Eastern India is empanelled as the lead training partner for the catering / hospitality sector in organized sector for eastern region by Food Safety & Standards Authority of India (FSSAI) to educate and equip hotels and restaurants in the Eastern region of India with food safety and security guidelines, we also conducted sessions of Food Safety Training & Certification (FOSTAC) Program in Advance Catering during the year.

As per FSSAI requirements all food businesses having Central Licences or State Licenses should have at least one trained and certified food safety supervisor for every 25 food-handlers or part thereof on all their premises. To implement this regulation FSSAI has approved Training Partners with an objective to ensure safe food everywhere. The curriculum and content of training has been created centrally. The same was mandated for each licensed Food Business Operator (FBO) and was notified vide FSSAI notification dated October 7, 2017.

During the year Managing Committee Members and officials of HRAEI have time to time held virtual meetings with FSSAI to evaluate the implementation of the regulations and share views on changes of polices and initiatives about food safety.

HRAEI took part in the World food safety day event organised by Government of India on 7^{th} June 2022.

MASS VACCINE DRIVE FOR HOSPITALITY WORKERS

HRAEI joined hands with the MSME Department, Government of West Bengal, to provide vaccination for hospitality workers in various venues across Kolkata.

EFFECTIVE PRESENCE IN ACCLAIMED BODIES

During the year, the Association had its effective presence with the following bodies:

Hotel & Restaurant Approval & Classification Committee, HRACC (Eastern Region):

The President of HRAEI is a member of this Committee representing the industry of Eastern Region. The Committee is chaired by Regional Director (East), India Tourism for the classification of 3 Star & below hotels located in Eastern Region. During the year, HRAEI actively participated in the classifications and re-classifications scheduled by HRACC.

FSSAI:

The Association ensured to make an integral representation in Food Safety and Standards Authority of India (FSSAI) and addressed emerging issues, challenges and constraints.

Institute of Hotel Management, Kolkata:

The President of HRAEI is a member of the Governing Board representing the industry of Eastern Region. The Committee of HRAEI has ensured its presence in the board meetings of IHM, Kolkata and contributed in the active promotion of the Hospitality and tourism industry.





State Institute of Hotel Management, Durgapur:

The President of HRAEI is a member of the Governing Board representing the industry of State Institute of Hotel Management, Durgapur. The Committee of HRAEI has ensured its presence in the board meetings of SIHM, Durgapur and contributed in the active promotion of the Hospitality and tourism industry.

CAMPAIGN TO ENCOURAGE DINERS TO PACK LEFTOVER FOOD IN KOLKATA

Restaurants across Kolkata took a joint initiative to prevent food wastage that encourages guests to get the leftovers of their ordered food packed for home or distribute it among the underprivileged. Several Kolkata diners have joined hands to lend support to this movement.

According to an estimate, 68 million tonnes of food is wasted in India everyday. The volume of wastage at restaurants in Kolkata is around 10% of the food served. A large number of diners don't bother about the leftovers and leave it on the table. The wasted food is often thrown out as garbage. But if customers are a little more careful, they can take it home to consume it later or give it to the hungry or needy.

The Hotel and Restaurant Association of Eastern India is one of the associations that has joined the initiative launched on Stop World Food Wastage Day (April 27, 2022), the campaign is called "Re-serve". Along with the digital campaign, tent cards were be placed on tables of prominent restaurants reminding customers to pack the excess food at no extra cost with a hashtag-- #ItsTooGoodToWaste.

The "Re-serve" campaign raised awareness about the wastage, so that food is no longer wasted. More than 300 restaurants have joined the campaign in Kolkata.

BENGAL GLOBAL BUSINESS SUMMIT (BGBS)

After a hiatus of two years owing to the COVID-19 pandemic, the West Bengal Government hosted the Bengal Global Business Summit (BGBS) on 20th and 21st April 2022, the business summit is a flagship programme where the State Government showcases the business readiness and investment potential before the global business community.

During the 2019 summit, the fifth edition of BGBS, the then finance minister Amit Mitra said that the state had received proposals worth over Rs 12.32 lakh crore at the business summits between 2015 and 2019 and had generated 28 lakh jobs.

This year Hospitality and Tourism featured prominently in the summit and there were specific sectoral sessions for the sector along with MSME. It was a huge opportunity for the hospitality industry to tap into these areas in order to bounce back after the pandemic-hit period of freeze. It is expected that it will be a boost to the ailing industry after a hiatus.

The colossal meet attracted the participation of thousands of delegates from several countries. HRAEI along with the Department of Tourism, Government of West Bengal took active initiative to make a programme on Tourism for Inclusive Growth.

CAREEREAST-2022

The Ministry of Tourism, Government of India, Regional Office (East), Kolkata is going to organize CareerEast-2022, a 5-days Career Festival for final year students of 3/4 years Degree/Diploma Courses in Hotel Management/ Culinary Arts in the month of September 2022. The event is being organized in association with Institute of Hotel Management, Kolkata and the Hotel & Restaurant Association of Eastern India (HRAEI). The venue for the event is the Institute of Hotel Management, P-16, Taratala Road, Kolkata-700088. All leading



Hotel Management Institutes from Eastern and North-Eastern states of India will be participating in the festival for recruiting resources at various levels in Hotels and Restaurants.

HRAEI MAGAZINE

HRAEI has promulgated its bi-monthly magazine 'MYSTIC EAST' religiously ever since November 2014. The magazine has been housing germane affairs of the hospitality sector that has been in conjunction with news and events across the eastern region. Immaculate endeavours have been made over the years to make the promulgation self-sustainable. The Magazine now has a circulation of about 1500 which is distributed among other regional heads of the hospitality industry as well as government authorities and offices and has been widely accepted and admired.

FHRAI MAGAZINE

HRAEI has actively bequeathed to the monthly magazine of Federation of Hotel & Restaurant Associations of India (FHRAI) with news, opinions and events as a representation of the Eastern region.

HRAEI WEBSITE

With the admittance of our website (www.hraei.co.in) communication has become effortless amid HRAEI and its associates. The website enables members to update their listing and other details pertaining to their businesses. The website also enhances our E-Magazine of 'Mystic East', HRAEI as well as industry related updates.

HRAEI ON SOCIAL MEDIA

HRAEI commenced its ubiquity on social media platforms including Facebook, Instagram and Twitter. We have been utilizing these platforms to accentuate the activities and events ventured by the Association, Government and Hospitality Industry. Report on the Audit of the Standalone Financial Statements

We have audited the standalone financial statements of M/s. HOTEL & RESTAURANT ASSOCIATION OF EASTERN INDIA ('the Association') which comprise the Balance Sheet as at March 31, 2022 and the Income & Expenditure Account for the year then ended and a summary of significant accounting policies and other explanatory information.

Opinion

In our opinion and to the best of our information and according to the explanations given to us, the financial statements give the information required by the Act in the manner so required and give a true and fair view in conformity with the accounting principles generally accepted in India:

- (i) in the case of the balance sheet, of the state of affairs of the Association as at March 31, 2022; &
- (ii) in the case of the Income & Expenditure Account, of the excess of income over expenditure for the year ended on that date.

Basis for opinion

Emphasis of Matter

The Company continues to evaluate them as highly probable considering the orders in hand. The situation is changing rapidly giving rise to inherent uncertainty around the extent and timing of the potential future impact of the COVID-19 pandemic which may be different from that estimated as at the date of approval of the financial results. The Company will continue to closely monitor any material changes arising of future economic conditions and impact on its business.

Management's Responsibility for the Standalone Financial Statements

"The Association's Managing Committee is responsible for the matters stated in section 134(5) of the Companies Act, 2013 ("the Act") with respect to the preparation of these standalone financial statements that give a true and fair view of the financial position, financial performance of the Association in accordance with the accounting principles generally accepted in India, including the accounting Standards specified under section 133 of the Act. This responsibility also includes maintenance of adequate accounting records in accordance with the provisions of the Act for safeguarding of the assets of the Association and for preventing and detecting frauds and other irregularities; selection and application of appropriate accounting policies; making judgments and estimates that are reasonable and prudent; and design, implementation and maintenance of adequate internal financial controls, that were operating effectively for ensuring the accuracy and completeness of the accounting records, relevant to the preparation and presentation of the financial statement that give a true and fair view and are free from material misstatement, whether due to fraud or error.

In preparing the financial statements, management is responsible for assessing the Association's ability to continue as a going concern, disclosing, as applicable, matters related to going concern and using the going concern basis of accounting unless management either intends to liquidate the Association or to cease operations, or has no realistic alternative but to do so.

(a) SIGNIFICANT ACCOUNTING POLICIES

(i) Basis of Preparation of Financial Statements

The financial statements are prepared and presented under the historical cost convention, on the accrual basis of accounting. Pursuant to Section 133 of the Companies Act, 2013 read with Rule 7 of the Companies (Accounts) Rules, 2014, till the Standards of Accounting or any addendum thereto are prescribed by Central Government in consultation and recommendation of the National Financial Reporting Authority, the existing Accounting Standards notified under the Companies Act, 1956 shall continue to apply. Consequently, these financial statements have been prepared to comply in all material aspects with the accounting standards notified under Section 211 (3C) [Companies (Accounting Standards) Rules, 2006, as amended] and other relevant provisions of the Companies Act, 2013 (the 'Act').

(ii) Use of Estimates

The preparation of financial statements in conformity with generally accepted accounting principles in India requires the management to make estimates and assumptions that affect the reported amounts of assets and liabilities and the disclosure of contingent liabilities on the date of the financial statements. Management believes that the estimates made in the preparation of the financial statements are prudent and reasonable. Actual results could differ from those estimates. Any revision to accounting estimates is recognized prospectively in current and future periods.

(iii) Fixed Assets & Depreciation

Fixed Assets are stated at cost, net of accumulated depreciation and accumulated impairment losses, if any. The cost comprises purchase price, borrowing costs, if capitalization criteria are met and directly attributable cost of bringing the asset to its working condition for the intended use. Any subsidy/ reimbursement/ contribution received for installation and acquisition of any fixed assets is shown as deduction in the year of receipt.

(iv) Investments

Investments, which are readily realizable and intended to be held for not more than one year from the date on which such investments are made, are classified as current investments. All other investments are classified as long term investments.

On initial recognition, all investments are measured at cost. The cost comprises purchase price and directly attributable acquisition charges such as brokerage, fees and duties. Current investments are carried in the financial statements at lower of cost and fair value determined on an individual investment basis. Long term investments are carried at cost.

However, provision for diminution in values is made to recognize a decline other than temporary in the value of the investments.

On disposal of an investment, the difference between its carrying amount and net disposal proceeds is charged or credited to the statement of profit and loss.

(v) Employee Benefits

Employee Benefit expenses such as salaries, wages, leave encashment are accounted for on accrual basis. Post employment benefits such as gratuity & ex - gratia payments are accounted for on cash basis.

(vi) Revenue Recognition

Income & Expenditure are recognised on Accrual Basis.

Interest earned on Fixed income securities are recognised as per accrual concept.

Further, revenue is recognized to the extent that it is probable that the economic benefits will flow to the Company and the revenue can be reliably measured.

(vii) Provisions, Contingent Liabilities & Contingent Assets

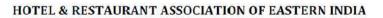
Provisions involving substantial degree of estimation in measurement are recognized when there is a present obligation as a result of a past events and it is probable that there will be an outflow of resources.

Contingent liabilities are not recognized but they are disclosed in the notes to accounts.

Contingent Assets are neither recognized nor disclosed in the financial statements.

(viii) Subscription

- (a) The primary source of association's income consists of subscriptions received from members. Income from subscriptions are recorded on accrual basis.

Hence a request was made to waive off the entire liability keeping in mind the aforementioned reason and the financial crunch due to the ongoing pandemic.
