Throughout the year, HRAEI has consistently engaged in meetings with FSSAI to assess the implementation of regulations and exchange views on policy changes and initiatives concerning food safety. These efforts reflect HRAEI's commitment to promoting adherence to food safety standards and ensuring consumer

well-being within the hospitality industry in the Eastern region.

EFFECTIVE PRESENCE IN ACCLAIMED BODIES

During the year, the Association had its effective presence with the following bodies:

Hotel & Restaurant Approval & Classification Committee, HRACC (Eastern Region):

The President of HRAEI holds a significant role as a member of the Committee representing the hospitality industry of the Eastern Region. This Committee, chaired by the Regional Director (East) of India Tourism, is responsible for the classification of hotels rated 5 stars Deluxe and below located in the Eastern Region. Throughout the year, HRAEI played an active role in these classification and re-classification processes scheduled by HRACC (Hotel and Restaurant Approval & Classification Committee). This participation underscores HRAEI's commitment to maintaining high standards within the hospitality industry and ensuring that hotels in the Eastern Region meet the required criteria for classification.

State Tourism Task Force & Sub-Committees:

The Government of West Bengal constituted 6 sub-committees to unravel and enhance the tourism potential in the State. 6 Sub-Committees have been constituted to promote the associated niche tourism sectors for (1) Rural Tourism (2) Heritage & Cultural Tourism (3) Eco Tourism (4) River Tourism (5) Adventure Tourism & (6) MICE Tourism. The President HRAEI is the Member of the State Tourism Task Force (MICE Tourism).

FSSAI:

The Association made it a priority to have a strong representation within the Food Safety

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and Standards Authority of India (FSSAI), actively engaging with the organization to address emerging issues, challenges, and constraints related to food safety. This proactive involvement demonstrates the Association's commitment to ensuring that the concerns and needs of its members in the hospitality industry are effectively communicated and addressed at the regulatory level. By participating in discussions and initiatives led by FSSAI, the Association plays a vital role in shaping policies and regulations that impact the food and beverage sector, ultimately contributing to the enhancement of food safety standards and practices within the industry.

State Institute of Hotel Management, Durgapur:

The President of HRAEI holds a significant role as a member of the Governing Board representing the hospitality industry at the State Institute of Hotel Management (SIHM), Durgapur. The Committee of HRAEI has consistently ensured its presence in the board meetings of SIHM, Durgapur, actively contributing to the promotion of the hospitality and tourism industry in the region. By participating in these meetings, the Committee of HRAEI collaborates with SIHM to address industry challenges, provide insights, and support initiatives aimed at fostering the growth and development of hospitality education and training. This partnership underscores HRAEI's commitment to nurturing talent and advancing the hospitality sector in the region through meaningful engagement with educational institutions like SIHM, Durgapur.

MEETING ON DURGA PUJA PARIKRAMA WITH HON'BLE TOURISM MINISTER AND PRINCIPAL SECRETARY, GOVERNMENT OF WEST BENGAL

The meeting held on September 26th, 2023, at Udayachal Tourist Lodge played a pivotal role in planning for Puja Parikrama 2023 during Durga Puja. The meeting was chaired by the Hon'ble Tourism Minister, Shri Indranil Sen, and attended by Smt. Nandini Chakravorty IAS, Principal Secretary, Tourism, as well as representatives from various hotels, the meeting had Mr. Sudesh Poddar, President of HRAEI, as an esteemed invitee.

During the meeting, the Hon'ble Tourism Minister highlighted the significance of Durga Puja and elaborated on the Puja Parikramas, a designated program by the Tourism Department of the Government of West Bengal. He urged hotels to actively promote these parikramas by displaying brochures in guest rooms and hotel lobbies, and by encouraging guest participation. He requested HRAEI to ensure smooth collaboration between hotels and the tourism department to ensure the success of this program.

President HRAEI, Mr. Sudesh Poddar, offered valuable insights and suggestions during the meeting, which were warmly received and appreciated. The discussions highlighted a collective commitment to enhancing cultural tourism and ensuring the grand success of Puja Parikrama 2023 through collaborative efforts between hotels and the tourism department. This unified approach reflects the dedication of all stakeholders towards promoting the rich cultural heritage of West Bengal and providing memorable experiences for visitors during Durga Puja.

WORKSHOP ON NATIONAL PLACEMENT BY PBSSD, TET&SD DEPARTMENT, GOVERNMENT OF WEST BENGAL

HRAEI attended the workshop on October 4th, 2023 place at Karigori Bhawan organized by the Department of Technical Education, Training, and Skill Development (TET&SD) on "Exploring Opportunities for National Placements." This workshop aimed to address the challenges and opportunities in providing gainful placement opportunities for graduates of ITIs, Polytechnics, VTCs, and short-term training programs.

State of West Bengal has a large skilled youth base who can grab the opportunity for employment



& livelihood. In this regard, the Department of Technical Education, Training and Skill Development Department provides the best quality employment-linked technical, vocational education and skills training to ensure gainful placement and employment opportunities for the State's trained youth. The Department has taken several initiatives towards creation of sustainable employment opportunities including introduction of the industry-led Training Programme; launching the Rojgar Seva Portal as an interface between the industry, pass outs, Government; mobilization of candidates through psychometric assessment tool Amar Karma Disha; introduction of course curricula aligned to industry needs; organizing regular Rojgar Melas in collaboration with industries etc.

INTERACTIVE SESSION WITH SMT. NANDINI CHAKRAVORTY, IAS, PRINCIPAL SECRETARY HOME DEPARTMENT GOVERNMENT OF BENGAL

HRAEI, in its commitment to fostering dialogue and collaboration, organized an interactive session with Smt. Nandini Chakravorty IAS, Principal Secretary Home and Hills Affairs, Government of West Bengal on Friday, 12th January 2024, at the Hyatt Regency, Kolkata.

This session provided a platform for Hotels and Restaurants to engage directly with Smt. Nandini Chakravorty IAS facilitating open communication and exchange of ideas. It was an opportunity for HRAEI and other participants to discuss pertinent issues, share insights, and explore avenues for cooperation with the government.

During the meeting, several critical issues concerning the hotel industry were addressed, notably the restriction on female performers in hotels and restaurants in the Bidhan Nagar area. It was highlighted that this policy not only impacts business opportunities for hotels but also contributes to a decline in cultural activities such as live music performances.

The Home Secretary acknowledged these concerns and assured that she would investigate the matter and work towards finding a resolution.

HOSPITALITY SECTOR GRANTED INDUSTRY STATUS IN WEST BENGAL

The Government of West Bengal took the landmark decision of granting Industry Status to certain tourism units in the tourism sector. Industry status will immensely help the sector to bounce back after it was badly affected by the pandemic. It would also help to draw investment in the sector that has a tremendous potential to generate jobs.

With the new industry status, hotels are poised to enjoy substantial savings on electricity bills, as they will now be charged power tariffs at the industrial rate, which is substantially lower than the commercial rate.

Furthermore, hotels are expected to benefit from reduced water supply bills, as they transition from paying commercial rates to industrial rates for water supply. Additionally, the hospitality sector stands to benefit from reduced license fees and other taxes, including property tax, once it receives industry status.

Another significant advantage of industry status is the entitlement to a better Floor Area Ratio (FAR), allowing for increased construction or floor area on a particular land. This enhanced FAR is expected to attract investors to establish hotels and other tourism-related infrastructure, fostering further growth in the sector.

HRAEI, has long advocated for industry status for the hospitality sector, engaging in discussions with ministers and bureaucrats to push for this position. With the cabinet's approval of the proposal, there is optimism that it will stimulate investor interest in West Bengal's tourism sector and facilitate the expansion of existing infrastructure.

REPRESENTATION GIVEN TO PRINCIPAL SECRETARY HOME DEPARTMENT TO ALLOW PERFORMANCE BY FEMALE CROONERS IN HOTELS AND RESTAURANTS IN BIDHANNAGAR AREA

HRAEI gave representation to Smt. Nanidini Chakravorty, IAS, Principal Secretary, Home and Hill

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Affairs Department, Government of West Bengal, to consider lifting restrictions on female crooners' performances at Hotels and Restaurants in the Bidhannagar area. These limitations not only hinder talented female performers but also contribute to declining footfall and business losses. HRAEI ensured all possible collaboration with the department to address this issue and promote inclusivity while ensuring compliance with regulations.

REPRESENTATION GIVEN TO FINANCE DEPARTMENT GOVERNMENT OF WEST BENGAL REQUESTING FOR WAIVER ON INTEREST AND PENALTY OF LUXURY TAX

In a letter addressed to Shri Manoj Pant, IAS, Additional Chief Secretary of the Finance Department, Government of West Bengal, HRAEI humbly requested a waiver on interest and penalties associated with Luxury Tax liabilities.

The letter highlights the challenges faced by the hospitality industry, particularly during the periods of the Covid pandemic, which led to significant financial strain for many establishments. With the industry now showing signs of recovery, the association proposed an Amnesty Scheme to resolve pending Luxury Tax matters, wherein only the principal amounts would be collected, and interest and penalties would be waived.

This proposed scheme is seen as mutually beneficial, providing relief to hospitality units burdened by past liabilities while also generating revenue for the government. Additionally, HRAEI suggested that reallocating resources from the Luxury Tax department to other taxation areas, such as GST, would optimize government manpower.

HRAEI expresses hope that this suggestion will be favorably considered for a win-win outcome.

BENGAL GLOBAL BUSINESS SUMMIT & HOSPITALITY SECTOR

The Bengal Global Business Summit (BGBS) saw

remarkable success this year, particularly from the perspective of the hospitality sector. The invaluable leadership of Smt. Nandini Chakravorty, IAS, Principal Secretary, Tourism Department played a pivotal role in fostering extensive participation from the hospitality industry, especially the HRAEI. Notably, the West Bengal government placed special emphasis on tourism at BGBS this year, a testament to her proactive initiative. The Tourism Sectoral session 'Heritage to Horizons' – harnessing the Tourism potential of Bengal was held on the second day of BGBS.

HRAEI worked hand in hand with the Tourism Department to ensure the event's resounding success. Their close collaboration and concerted efforts undoubtedly contributed to the grandeur of the occasion. This collaborative spirit exemplifies the power of synergy in driving positive outcomes, ultimately showcasing the immense potential of the hospitality sector in West Bengal.

HRAEI MET HON'BLE MAYOR OF KOLKATA REGARDING SOLID WASTE MANAGEMENT ISSUE

The Kolkata Municipal Corporation (KMC) issued demand notices for conservancy services to member establishments under Section 333 of the KMC Act, 1980, with a significant increase in fees. In response, efforts were made by HRAEI, including meetings with the Hon'ble Mayor, Kolkata Municipal Corporation, Shri Firhad Hakim, and submissions regarding the rationalization and reduction of these charges.

Subsequently, the Hon'ble Mayor convened a meeting with Chief Municipal Engineer (SWM), where the matter was discussed. A final meeting took place in the chambers of Chief Municipal Engineer (SWM) with him and Deputy Chief Engineer (SWM1) and Chairman of the Redressal Committee, Solid Waste Management Department. During this meeting, it was advised that individual members should address their grievances regarding the demand notices

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directly to the Deputy Chief Engineer (SWM1), Chairman of the Redressal Committee, Solid Waste Management Department.

It was clarified that the case couldn't be considered collectively as an association due to regulations gazetted on 19th June 2020. Hence, the association urged all members to individually express their concerns regarding conservancy charges to the department.

MEETING WITH EXCISE COMMISSIONER GOVERNMENT OF WEST BENGAL

A delegation led by President HRAEI met Shri Kaushik Bhattacharya, I.A.S. Excise Commissioner, Government of West Bengal on 1st March 2024. During the meeting with the Excise Commissioner, concerns was raised regarding the advisory (No. C-1145/1(100)E, dated January 9, 2024)that all the retail license holders for alcoholic beverages in West Bengal shall duly refrain from adopting any unfair means to allure customers of alcoholic drinks with due regard to the Govt. policy. It was highlighted that the directive, which impacts the retail sales of alcoholic beverages within the state, holds profound implications for establishments such as hotels, restaurants, bars, and clubs. These hospitality units significantly rely on liquor sales to boost their business. It was emphasized that the alcoholic beverages offered in these establishments are priced above the Maximum Retail Price (MRP), ensuring compliance with government regulations even after discounts or incentives are applied.

Recognizing the pivotal role of liquor in enhancing the dining experience and its consequential impact on the food and beverage industry, a respectful request was made for a reconsideration of the advisory's stance, particularly regarding On-License establishments. The proposal put forth during the meeting suggested the exclusion of these establishments from the restrictive measures outlined in the advisory. It was argued that permitting the continuation of promotional offers

and incentives in these operations is vital not only for sustaining business but also for fostering the economic growth of the region. The participants expressed their gratitude for the consideration of the request and eagerly anticipated a favourable response from the Excise Department.

REQUEST MADE EXCISE COMMISSIONER GOVERNMENT OF WEST BENGAL TO FOR ADJUSTMENT IN SUPPLY FREQUENCY OF KINGFISHER DRAUGHT BEER

Kingfisher draught beer has been a popular choice among patrons of restaurants and bars. However, a recent change in the supply frequency of this product has posed challenges for Bar and Restaurants. Previously, Bars and Restaurants used to receive Kingfisher draught beer deliveries three times a week because its shelf life was short. However, with improved preservation techniques, the shelf life got extended. As a result, United Breweries now deliver the beer only once a week. This change has led to challenges in restocking, as it's difficult to accurately predict weekly consumption. Sometimes Bars and Restaurants end up with excess beer, leading to wastage, while sometimes they run out of supply due to higher-than-expected demand. This impacts ability to serve customers and affects overall business operations. In this regards, Mr Sudesh Poddar, President, had met the respected Excise commissioner of West Bengal, Shri Kaushik Bhattacharya, I.A.S, to advocate for an increase in the supply frequency of Kingfisher draught beer twice a week instead of once and submitted a representation in this regard.

Schedule - 1

(a) SIGNIFICANT ACCOUNTING POLICIES

(i) Basis of Preparation of Financial Statements

The financial statements are prepared and presented under the historical cost convention, on the accrual basis of accounting. Pursuant to Section 133 of the Companies Act, 2013 read with Rule 7 of the Companies (Accounts) Rules, 2014, till the Standards of Accounting or any addendum thereto are prescribed by Central Government in consultation and recommendation of the National Financial Reporting Authority, the existing Accounting Standards notified under the Companies Act, 1956 shall continue to apply. Consequently, these financial statements have been prepared to comply in all material aspects with the accounting standards notified under Section 211 (3C) [Companies (Accounting Standards) Rules, 2006, as amended] and other relevant provisions of the Companies Act, 2013 (the 'Act').

(ii) Use of Estimates

The preparation of financial statements in conformity with generally accepted accounting principles in India requires the management to make estimates and assumptions that affect the reported amounts of assets and liabilities and the disclosure of contingent liabilities on the date of the financial statements. Management believes that the estimates made in the preparation of the financial statements are prudent and reasonable. Actual results could differ from those estimates. Any revision to accounting estimates is recognized prospectively in current and future periods.

(iii) Property, Plant & Equipments

Fixed Assets are stated at cost, net of accumulated depreciation and accumulated impairment losses, if any. The cost comprises purchase price, borrowing costs, if capitalization criteria are met and directly attributable cost of bringing the asset to its working condition for the intended use. Any subsidy/ reimbursement/ contribution received for installation and acquisition of any fixed assets is shown as deduction in the year of receipt.

(iv) Investments

Investments, which are readily realizable and intended to be held for not more than one year from the date on which such investments are made, are classified as current investments. All other investments are classified as long term investments.

On initial recognition, all investments are measured at cost. The cost comprises purchase price and directly attributable acquisition charges such as brokerage, fees and duties. Current investments are carried in the financial statements at lower of cost and fair value determined on an individual investment basis. Long term investments are carried at cost.

However, provision for diminution in values is made to recognize a decline other than temporary in the value of the investments.

On disposal of an investment, the difference between its carrying amount and net disposal proceeds is charged or credited to the statement of profit and loss.

(v) Employee Benefits

Employee Benefit expenses such as salaries, wages, leave encashment are accounted for on accrual basis. Post employment benefits such as gratuity & ex - gratia payments are accounted for on cash basis.

(vi) Revenue Recognition

Income & Expenditure are recognised on Accrual Basis.

Interest earned on Fixed income securities are recognised as per accrual concept.

Further, revenue is recognized to the extent that it is probable that the economic benefits will flow to the Company and the revenue can be reliably measured.

(vii) Provisions, Contingent Liabilities & Contingent Assets

Provisions involving substantial degree of estimation in measurement are recognized when there is a present obligation as a result of a past events and it is probable that there will be an outflow of resources.

Contingent liabilities are not recognized but they are disclosed in the notes to accounts.

Contingent Assets are neither recognized nor disclosed in the financial statements.

(viii) Subscription

- (a) The primary source of association's income consists of subscriptions received from members. Income from subscriptions are recorded on accrual basis.
- **(b)** All the figures have been rounded off to the nearest rupee.
- (c) Figures in the previous year have been regrouped / rearranged wherever considered necessary to confirm this year's classification.
